	4. Justice Diplom	a Program Changes		
	The proposal was presented to implement changes to the Justice Diploma program for Fall 2025 implementation. The program is a two-year, four-term structure, offering students the opportunity to complete both mandatory and elective courses. The following changes were requested:			
	Proposed Changes:			
	COMM 1001: Intro to Communication	Remove the mandatory course from Term 2 and replace it with Indigenous Studies I (INST 1000).		
	JUST 2206 (Correctional Law) JUST 2207 (Correctional Methods- Electives)	Merge both the courses and it will be called JUST 2206: Correctional Methods & Law. This change removes the duplicate content and combines everything into a single, clear course.		
	JUST 2101 (Canadian Criminal procedure)	Combine both courses to become one new course. The new course will be called – JUST 2101.

	Program Credit Load Changes	Total program credits – Reduced from 63 to 60. Term 2 adjustment – Reduced from six courses (including two electives) to five courses (including one elective).		
	 Consultation Pathways and Admissions approved the changes on October 22, 2024. Justice faculty members approved the changes following consultation with the Program Chair. On November 5, the Justice Program Advisory Committee met with students and external representatives from Edmonton Police Services, RCMP, and the City of Edmonton. The changes were approved by the Program & Curriculum Subcommittee on November 20, 2024. 			

•	The changes were approved by the Deans' Council on November 21, 2024.	
Questi	ions:	
1.	A question was raised about the Program Chair interviews and the number of applicants going under the interview process associated with the workload on the Program Chair. Ayshea Thornton highlighted that this intake includes 80 students, with 23 students starting their internships in September. A suggestion was made to add a Program Chair or designate to the process to ensure there is continuity in this process and adequate workload on the Program Chair.	
2.	Hebah Abukhadra enquired how new students starting in 2026 will adjust to the program changes. Ayshea Thornton clarified that ongoing students in the second term would not be affected by the changes. Students from 2025 can still take elective courses in 2026.	
3.	Loni Robertson added that these changes will not take effect until 2026, ensuring the program does not change midway through for current students.	
4.	Hebah Abukhadra inquired about the risks associated with combining the two courses. Ayshea Thornton assured that there would be no loss, as both courses are similar in content and depth.

•	Students will build a professional portfolio and present their work in a design showcase as part of their final Capstone project. Specific courses may be eligible for transfer to various post-secondary institutions (PSIs) in Alberta. The full program is transferable to NAIT's Bachelor of Technology, as detailed on the Alberta Council on Admission and Transfer page.	
Questi	ions:	
-	Ama Dogbefou raised concerns about the lack of part-time options, as the program is currently offered only as full- time. Ayshea Thornton justified that introducing a part-time option could delay the program for students but noted it is something that could be considered in the future.	
2.	It was questioned if GED, which is not recognized in Canada, has been replaced by CAEC. Ayshea Thornton clarified that Bow Valley College (BVC) currently accepts GED in its system. Debbie Little highlighted that most admission offices rely on historical data, which is why GED is still included.	
3.	A question was raised regarding the possibility of course- to-course transferability. Ayshea Thornton stated that this could be a possibility in the future.	
4.	Bev Suntjens highlighted that brokering programs allows the college to access new programming opportunities. However, some aspects are designed by other institutions and need to be accommodated.	
5.	Debbie Little mentioned that all policies and procedures for this program will follow NorQuest College (NQ) standards. While Bow Valley College provides the curriculum, NorQuest will host the program and deliver student support services.	
6.	A Question was raised about the possibility of NorQuest offering the program independently in the future instead of through a brokering arrangement. Loni Robertson highlighted that brokering enables the college to explore new programming options more cost-effectively.

	6. 2025-26 Tuition & Fees Consultation		
	Brad Arkison shared a presentation outlining the process and next steps for the program consultation.		
	This is the first of two planned meetings. The December meeting focuses on gathering feedback, while the February meeting will aim for final approval.		
	The Tuition and Related Fees policy ensures that tuition and fees are developed or revised in an open and transparent way, complying with the Alberta Post-Secondary Learning Act and Tuition and Fees Regulations. It also includes appropriate consultation with students.		
	Tuition and fees are reviewed annually, with planning now underway for the 2025-26 academic year.		
	Consultations: Key consultations include engagement with SANQC, with further discussions planned before the February meeting. The team will return in February following the SANQC consultation seeking recommendation for approval.		
6:20	 Approval of Plan by Board of Governors (March 2024): 2% average cap for domestic tuition increases, with up to 10% allowed for specific programs. Four programs received approval for increases above 2%: Administrative Professional: 5.2% Pharmacy Technician, Therapeutic Recreation, and Practical Nurse: 2.8% International tuition saw an average increase of 6%, with program-specific increases ranging from 3% to 7%. Foundational Learning program tuition and fees remain unchanged for 2024-25. No new Mandatory Non-Instructional Fees were approved. The proposed Recreation and Leisure Fee was paused to gauge student interest through a satisfaction survey. 2025-26 Approach: Domestic tuition increases are aligned with market assessments. No changes were made to Mandatory Non-Instructional Fees (MNIFs). Proposal 1 - 5% domestic tuition increase is proposed for the Social Work Program, amounting to \$350 per year. Background - The program faces higher delivery costs due to ACSW accreditation requirements, including practicums, field placements, and instructor qualifications, and the increase addresses a two-year operating deficit to ensure sustainability.
